Dealing with Mother Nature can be frustrating to say the least. We get whatever she serves up whether it's to our liking or not. This last month here in Cabo Blanco there was nothing particularly objectionable UNLESS fishing and life offshore was the primary focus which in our case it is. With a few short periods of warm water brought in by currents from the North the water was colder than what we would like from the fishing stand point. High winds further complicated the situation. The upside is that when the conditions were favorable the fishing action was pretty dependable. We were finding decent numbers of tuna around the porpoise schools. Nothing huge but still a 50 pounder will give you a good fight and put quite a bit of really tasty food on the table.

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Weather and offshore conditions always seem to cycle. Lessons in patience are plentiful and, as usual, the patience pays off. Historically there has been marlin in excess of a thousand pounds caught here in Cabo Blanco in every month of the year. Our mission is to be ready to take full advantage of good conditions when we have them and not get our panties in a bunch when we don't. Be grateful for the opportunity to witness firsthand and on daily basis nature at its finest. Whales, some bigger than the boat, sea lions, turtles, countless species of seabirds and of course the fish. Nothing to complain about here. Somewhere someone is digging up a septic tank in 100 degree temperature. I'm sure that person would trade places with us in a heartbeat.
