UP TO 700 people drowned when a fishing boat capsized in what is feared to be the worst Mediterranean migrant disaster so far.

Eyewitnesses said the packed 70ft vessel overturned as the passengers rushed to one side when they saw a Portuguese cargo ship approaching.

The ship, called the King Jacob, had gone to their aid and the migrants


Discover your spiritual side in a secret part of the Andes

THE latest addition to the booming spiritual escape sector is hidden deep in the Sacred Valley of the Incas in the Andes, close to both Machu Picchu and Cusco. This glossy hacienda,
