



NORTHERN CHILE

SANTIAGO

The capital of Chile, vibrant Santiago, is a bustling city tucked away in a valley surrounded by the Andean foothills. Founded in 1541, Santiago is now a thriving metropolis dotted with fine eateries and top-class hotels. It is the only city in the world that offers skiing high up in the majestic Andes, followed a mere 90 minutes later by walks on the beach and surfing in the Pacific Ocean. Guests visiting the Chilean capital are in for a heady mix of exclusive boutiques, sprawling shopping centres, magnificent architecture and discerning residential areas.

WINE COUNTRY

Not-to-be-missed is a memorable adventure through Chile's flourishing Wine Country, a mecca for wine enthusiasts and culture lovers alike. Perfect climatic conditions of hot summers, cool coastal breezes and gentle rainfalls ensure bountiful grape harvests that create delectable varieties of Cabernet Sauvignon, Sauvignon Blanc, Chardonnay and Carménère, the emblematic grape of Chile which hails from France and is now exclusive to Chile. Cushioned between the Andes and Coastal Mountains lies the Central Valley where the first vineyards were established in the colonial era. Travellers are treated to world-class wine tasting tours led by renowned sommeliers, luxury accommodation and a range of additional adventures such as food pairings, cycling through the vineyards and museum excursions.

ATACAMA DESERT

The sheer starkness of the Atacama Desert in the north of Chile is one of aweinspiring beauty. A landmark of the El Norte Grande ("The Big North"), the Atacama Desert boasts an incredible landscape of ragged, rocky mountains and ravines that are interspersed by a striking white salt pan and surrounded by towering volcanoes. The dramatic and desolate Atacama Desert boasts clear, unpolluted skies that allow for the most incredible, unforgettable stargazing. Amongst the desolate landscapes is the quaint town of San Pedro de Atacama, which serves as a gateway to the desert's main attractions: Tatio Geysers, the quaint desert town of Toconao, the Atacama Salt Flat, the Chaxa Lagoon with its Chilean and Andean flamingos, the eerily beautiful Valley of the Moon and Mars Valley.

EASTER ISLAND

A tiny island in the middle of an isolated spot in the Pacific Ocean, Easter Island nevertheless holds a huge attraction for visitors. Rapa Nui, as its 6 000 native Polynesian inhabitants call it, is famous for its striking and mysterious giant statues, the magnificent moai. With more than 900 ancient statues, carved between 1 250 and 1 500 AD, dotted throughout the island; this archaeological paradise was named a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1995. Along with its wondrous stone busts, Easter Island can also offer fabulous diving, snorkelling and surfing opportunities, as well as some splendid stretches of white sandy beaches to just relax and soak in the wild beauty of this enigmatic island.

SOUTHERN CHILE

NORTHERN PATAGONIA

Patagonia offers a kaleidoscopic mix of remote and untamed landscapes that will thrill the senses with their unrivalled beauty. Highlights of northern Patagonia include Coyhaique, Lake General Carrera, Laguna San Rafael National Park, Patagonia Park of Douglas Tompkins and Caleta Tortel. Volcanoes, mountains, glaciers and lakes create one of the most beautiful natural sites Chile has to offer. Enormous ice fields flank brilliant blue glaciers whilst fjords and deep channels usher penguins to their waters. The region's lakes and rivers are renowned for boasting some of the greatest fly fishing opportunities. Embark on a one-of-a kind boat excursion to the iconic Marble cathedral in General Carrera Lake, or enjoy kayaking, canyoneering, rock climbing, fishing, hiking or skiing adventures in one of the most pristine areas of the continent.

SOUTHERN PATAGONIA

The south of Patagonia is home to Chile's iconic Parque Nacional Torres del Paine, renowned for its rugged horn-shaped peaks of the Cuernos del Paine and pristine sand-coloured lowlands where the huaso countrymen, or baqueano, practice age-old cattle herding traditions. Southern Patagonia is hailed as one of the best destinations for hiking and trekking adventures. Not only does this breathtaking region feature a rich entanglement of rainforest and mountain ranges that stretch across the horizon, but it is also the official gateway to Antarctica, the earth's southernmost continent.





LAKE DISTRICT

The utterly spectacular landscapes of the Lake District makes this destination a firm favourite of guests travelling to Chile. Breathtaking glacial lakes mirror the frosted tips of dormant volcanoes and the verdant flora of nearby national parks. Stretching over 300 kilometres (186 miles), this region was once the homeland of the courageous Mapuche people who fought off the advances of Inca and Spanish invaders. It has since grown from thriving farmlands into the tranquil tourist mecca it is today. Quaint villages, such as Pućon perch along the various lake shorelines and offer adventures such as horse riding, hiking, fishing, mountain climbing, nature walks and water sports. Pućon is situated along the shores of the Villarrica Lake, near the active Volcano Villarrica.

CHILOÉ ISLAND

Chiloé is one of the many islands that dot this picturesque landscape of the Lake District. As the second largest island in South America, it is home to the Chiloé National Park, which Charles Darwin wrote extensively about, detailing the region's exceptional wildlife, in his book "The Voyage of the Beagle". Here, local Chilotes showcase their unique customs and palafitos (wooden structures built over the water on stilts), where they greet travellers upon arrival. Be sure to visit Castro, the third oldest town of Chile and the capital of Chiloé, to tuck into its speciality dish of curanto, a scrumptious combination of meats, seafood and vegetables.

SULTRY AND WILD

BUENOS AIRES

The capital city of Buenos Aires offers a pulsating and eclectic atmosphere of sophistication. It is here that local customs are infused by the proud traditions of football and the sultry tango. Buenos Aires is dotted with many fine eateries, a thriving arts and culture scene, packed nightclubs and world-class accommodation. The city is flanked by the Rio de la Plata, the world's largest estuary, and the lowlands of the Pampas. There are various tours that cover the rich history of the city. Be sure to stop at the Plaza de Mayo and Cementerio de la Recoleta.



IGUAZU FALLS

The Iguazu (also called Iguassu) Falls are composed of 275 separate cascades, which make it the largest broken waterfall in the world. Made up of a chain of waterfalls that are fed by the Iguazu River, this powerful phenomenon sits on the border of Argentina, Paraguay and Brazil. Set amongst lush forests, this is a truly breath-taking spectacle as thousands of litres of water tumble down the steps of the Parana Plateau. A highlight of any visit to the Iguazu Falls is a stop at Devil's Throat, a narrow u-shaped chasm that offers excellent photographic opportunities.

ESTANCIAS (CORDOBA)

Beautiful Cordoba, in Argentina, offers wonderful historical tours as well as the unforgettable opportunity to meet a gaucho at an estancia. At the heart of Argentina lies the Cordoba province where the country's second largest city of Cordoba resides. Tucked away in the foothills of the Sierras Chicas, this charming city was founded in 1573. It houses Argentina's oldest university that dates back to 1613 and many historical monuments such as the Jesuit Block, which has been declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site. The surrounding landscapes are characterised by low mountains interspersed by rivers and streams. It is here that you will find rustic estancias, Argentina's cattle stations that are manned by roughened gauchos. A visit to an estancia will give you a true glimpse into the rural lifestyle of Argentina.

SALTA

The north western Salta Province has long been visited for its exceptional landscapes of mountains and valleys that are home to many rural cultures. At the centre of this region is the captivating city of Salta, which means "beautiful" in the language of the Aymara people. This now flourishing metropolis offers a beautiful mix of old and new, where you will find modern architecture accentuated by colonial era buildings. Salta offers a laid-back atmosphere where every aspect of the day is taken in its stride. This all changes over Carnival where the citizens of the city spill into the streets to celebrate Pachamama. There are various museums, architectural delights and markets that will keep you busy in the city. Be sure to visit the Plaza 9 de Julio, the Museo Arqueologia de Alta Montana, the Iglesia de San Francisco and the Catedral Basilica de Salta.

MENDOZA

Beautiful Mendoza is the gateway city for an authentic Argentine Winelands experience. Recognised as the Wine Capital of Argentina, this enchanting destination's signature trademarks are its leafy avenues with Av San Martin taking pride of place as the main street and its beautiful plazas and acequias (irrigation ditches), fed by the Mendoza and Tunuyan Rivers, which line every facet of the city. One can expect a truly cosmopolitan and stylish ambience when visiting one of the many eateries that pay homage to the region's finest produce and, of course, wines.

ARILOCHE

BARILOCHE

Those with a penchant for breathtaking scenery, skiing, hiking and photography will love the gateway city of Bariloche, situated in the northern Patagonia region of Argentina, in the Lago Nahuel Huapi National Park. It is from here that lovers of the snow, launch their expeditions to the country's renowned snow-capped Cerro Catedral and Lopez Mountains and for adventurers to embark on the famous lake crossing of the Andes into Chile. Bariloche boasts beautiful Swiss-style chalets accentuated by carpentry and stone masonry from Patagonia. This is mixed with world-class boutique hotels and dotted with stores dedicated to all things chocolate.

ATLANTIC PATAGONIA

The Argentinian Patagonia is situated close to the Atlantic Ocean and incorporates the Peninsula de Valdes and the Tierra del Fuego Island. Here the characteristic golden lowlands of the Pampas meet breathtaking fjords, channels and bays that are home to thriving sea life. An iconic destination in Atlantic Patagonia is the renowned World Heritage Site of Peninsula Valdes where orcas beach themselves on the shoreline in an attempt to grab a sea lion (the only place where this spectacle has been witnessed) and southern right whales and elephant seals explore the waters during the months of July through December.

CALAFATE

Sitting on the edge of Patagonia's ice field, in the province of Santa Cruz, is the bustling town of Calafate. This is the main entry point to view the advancing Perito Moreno glacier in the popular Parque Nacional los Glaciares. Calafate is a must for photographers and nature lovers as viewing the ever-shifting landscape of the Perito Moreno is a not-to-be-missed spectacle. Here, guests can traverse through spectacular iceberg-strewn lakes on a boat ride up to the Perito Moreno to witness it "calve" (huge chunks of ice can fall off the glacier's snout at a moment's notice) and also have the opportunity to walk on its icy surface. Other than witnessing glaciers, visitors to Calafate can embark on a hiking or climbing expedition at nearby El Chalten and enjoy a fishing excursion to Lago Roca, horse riding, mountain and quad biking or spending a day at an estancia (working ranch).

Museums, ancient archaeological sites, beautiful beaches, wondrous nature reserves, vibrant nightlife, and the thrill of adventure sports, give Peru's capital an authentic and unique personality. The city is also known for its outstanding cuisine, which encompass specialties from ceviche and traditional coastal cooking to refined global fare. This energetic, sprawling metropolis promises visitors an unforgettable experience that is rich in culture, and high in excitement.

MACHU PICCHU AND THE CUSCO REGION


Home to the famous ruins of Machu Picchu, the Incan capital of Cusco and the Incan farming region of the Sacred Valley, travellers can expect a wonderfully interpretive introduction to what was once the largest empire in pre-Columbian America. A shroud of mystery envelopes the citadel of Machu Picchu, some speculate that it was established as a university, while others claim that it was built as a retreat for royalty. Approximately 75 kilometres (47 miles) away is the vibrant city of Cusco, once the capital of the Incas. Bustling markets, brimming with authentic curios, and beautiful architecture inspired by both the Incans and Spanish, add to the charm of the city. Tucked in-between Cusco and Machu Picchu is the flourishing Sacred Valley, guardian of a number of prominent ancient sites, and a destination that completes the Incan circuit.

LAKE TITICACA


Situated in the Andes, on the border of Peru and Bolivia, the magnificent Lake Titicaca is one of the largest, deepest, and highest bodies of water on the globe. Considered by the Incas to be the sacred birthplace of human civilisation, this shimmering, deep blue lake has numerous highlights to offer visitors. From the wondrous floating islands of Uros, to the island of Taquile, which is home to traditional weavers whose textiles, ponchos and purses are UNESCO protected as cultural heritage, Lake Titicaca is a unique, dramatic landscape of natural wonder and ancient culture.

NAZCA LINES

Etched on the Pampas de Jumana, between the towns of Nazca and Palpa, are the remarkable and mystifying Nazca Lines. Some 300 ancient geoglyphs, which date between 400 and 650 AD, depict various figures, with five being the most prominent; the hummingbird, the monkey, the spider, the hands and the astronaut. A UNESCO World Heritage Site, described as "the most outstanding group of geoglyphs anywhere in the world", the Nazca Lines cover a staggering 1 000 square kilometres. Created by the Nazca people, no one truly knows why the geoglyphs were made – some believe that they are related to astronomy or that they were a way for the tribe to connect with their gods in the sky. The best way to view and appreciate the sheer scale of the Nazca Lines are from above on a scenic flight.

NATURE & CULTURE

AREQUIPA

A World Heritage Site as designated by UNESCO, the White City knows well how to maintain its colonial heritage to the point where you can do your banking in old and gorgeous mansions. The downtown is particularly beautiful, with a heart of finished white volcanic stone called sillar that has been fashioned into arches, facades and cupolas. As there are huge snowcapped mountains rising high into the sky, so are there deep wounds in the surface of the Earth. Canyons like Cotahuasi and Colca, start out as fertile, terraced and pleasant valleys that later taper and plunge into dizzying canyons.



COLCA CANYON

A patchwork of serene valleys, guarded by rugged hills, and sprinkled with bubbling hot springs and pre-Incan agricultural terraces, which are still maintained by the enchanting inhabitants of the region, the Colca Canyon is truly a site to behold. Stretching out as far as the eye can see, the magnificence of Peru's second largest canyon, whose belly sits at approximately 3 400 metres (11 200 feet), attracts a plethora of adventure seekers, photographers, nature lovers and cultural enthusiasts every year. Its star attractions include the mighty condor, South America's emblematic bird of prey, spectacular hiking and mountain bike trails, ancient monuments and culturally significant destinations. Be sure to stop at the Colca Valley, steeped in pre-Incan heritage and dotted with beautiful towns established in the Spanish colonial era. Wildlife enthusiasts can make their way to the Cruz del Condor to view Peru's "Eternity Birds" in flight.

NORTHERN AMAZON (IQUITOS)

The Peruvian Amazon is defined in two parts; the northern Amazon Basin and the southern Amazon Basin. The northern Amazon Basin can be accessed via lquitos. This spectacular area is renowned for its exceptional boat cruises along the mammoth Amazon River that snakes its way through impenetrable emerald jungles, to neighbouring Brazil, before entering the Atlantic Ocean. Travellers to the region are offered the unrivalled opportunity to encounter a multitude of exquisite wildlife and engage with the Amazon's indigenous inhabitants. While exceptional treks within the rainforest are undoubtedly a highlight, the attraction of the northern Amazon Basin lies in its unrivalled water excursions. Exclusive boat cruises along secluded stretches of the Amazon River introduce visitors to the incredible diversity of animals and birdlife that live along or within this breathtaking life-force.

SOUTHERN AMAZON (PUERTO MALDONADO)

Hailed as one of Peru's remotest territories, the southern Amazon Basin sets itself apart from its northern counterpart by offering diverse wildlife sightings and interpretive jungle explorations. Pristine and untouched habitats shelter an incredible variety of animal and birdlife, while tranquil canoe expeditions, along the tributaries of the Amazon River, offer more intimate explorations of the region. Encounter exceptional species such as the endangered giant river otter, red howler monkey, caiman and side-neck turtle in the spectacular Tambopata National Reserve, which has been called the Biodiversity Capital of Peru. Visit local fruit and cacao farming communities and embark on guided hikes underneath the mottled shade of the rainforest canopy. LEGENDARY LANDSCAPES

GALAPAGOS

The most prominent of Ecuador's attractions is the pristine chain of volcanic islands that make up the UNESCO World Heritage Site of the Galapagos. Situated 972 kilometres (604 miles) west of the mainland, the Galapagos Islands are a mecca for nature enthusiasts. Made famous by Charles Darwin who studied the island's fantastic array of species, which ultimately contributed to his theory of evolution, the island's endemic fauna and flora are as fascinating today as they were in 1835. The islands' moon-like landscapes, interspersed with rugged vegetation, certainly create an ethereal atmosphere, yet they are haven to a flourishing population of marine iguanas, sea lions, giant tortoises and an exceptional array of birds such as the blue-footed boobie, frigatebird and flightless cormorant.

QUITO & SURROUNDS

Renowned as one of South America's most scenic cities; Quito, Ecuador's bustling capital, offers a wonderful mix of old and new. Here, its iconic Old Town, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, showcases an astounding array of monuments and colonial architecture; all built on the ruins of an Incan city. Bustling markets give way to a flourishing commercial centre, while tranquil neighbourhoods offer insight into the everyday life of its inhabitants. Just outside of Quito, visitors can explore some of the country's most prominent haciendas or browse through the popular Otavalo Market – a weekly showcase of some of the region's finest handicrafts and jewellery. Outdoor enthusiasts can also use Quito as a gateway before discovering the marvels of Ecuador's renowned cloud forest.

CUENCA & SURROUNDS

Enchanting Cuenca, is a must-see destination on any Ecuadorian itinerary. Situated near the city of Guayaqui (the main port of Ecuador and one of the gateways to the Galapagos), it has been hailed as the country's most picturesque city. This exceptional UNESCO World Heritage Site is beautifully positioned in the Andes, with the Tomebamba River at its foot. Steeped in heritage, Cuenca (also known as the Athens of the Andes) offers the photographic and cultural lover a marvellous showcase of colonial architecture, historical monuments and attractions such as the blue-domed Catedral Nueva. The best way to view this city is on a guided walking tour where, in addition to its fantastic landmarks, travellers are introduced to vibrant markets and the day-to-day hustle and bustle of its residents.

AMAZON

The Ecuadorian Amazon is truly a site to behold. It is here that the Spanish conquistadors journeyed deep into its jungles in search of the legendary city of El Dorado. The pièce de résistance of Ecuador's mainland landscapes, the untamed rainforests are a major drawcard for adventure travellers and nature enthusiasts. Here, half of the country's mammal species exist alongside enchanting indigenous tribes, in one of the world's most bio-diverse regions. Encounter an incredible array of wildlife such as howler and tamarin monkeys, ocelots, tapirs, freshwater dolphins, the mighty jaguar, giant otters and a staggering variety of birdlife on incredible hiking and boating excursions. Not-to-be-missed is a stop at the Napo Wildlife Centre, in the Yasuni National Park, which was built by the Kichwa Anangu community.



BEFORE YOU BOOK

Travel insurance

Do my guests require travel insurance and what does & Beyond's emergency evacuation insurance entail?

It is essential that adequate travel insurance be taken out prior to departure. This should cover any medical situation such as hospitalisation, as well as cancellation, curtailment of arrangements and baggage. Please contact us for further details.

Internet connectivity

Will guests be able to connect to the internet during their trip?

Internet access is widely available in major cities. Guests should be able to connect to the internet in most places frequented by tourists like hotels; however, WI-FI connectivity is limited and intermittent at lodges in remote areas.

Safety

Will my guests be safe?

- In terms of personal safety, the same rules apply as to every international destination in the world. Guests are advised to keep their belongings close and guarded at all times, and not to go wandering about alone at night. When visiting South America's cities and smaller towns, they must be on the alert for pickpockets. It is advised that guests check with their tour operator or hotel concierge they will know if there are any potentially unsafe areas along your guests' travel route.
- If guests are on a self-drive adventure, they must please ensure that their car is locked at all times and must park in well-lit, busy areas.
- Guests are advised to dress-down (i.e. don't wear excessive jewellery) when exploring South America's diverse cities. Concealed travel wallets are recommended.

BEFORE YOU GO

Passports & Visas

What are the passport and visa requirements for the various South American countries?

Guests are advised to check with their consulate for the latest visa information. It is a mandatory requirement that guests travel to South America with at least two blank passport pages per country visited and that their passport is valid for 6 months after the date of travel. If there is insufficient space in the passport, entry into a country could be denied. We advise you make copies of all your important documents (visa, passport, credit cards, air tickets, etc.). In case they are misplaced as it will make replacing them much easier.

- Single parents or grandparents travelling with a child (minor under age of 18) should be aware that most countries in Latin America require notarised, written parental consent for the child to travel from the non-custodial parent or absent parents.
- Citizens of most Western European countries do not require a visa for Chile, please check with your consulate if this applies to your country.
- Chilean Reciprocity Fee Australian and Mexican citizens do not require a visa, but must pay a one-time "reciprocity fee" upon arrival at Santiago's International Airport. This fee corresponds to the amount a Chilean national must pay when travelling to those countries. The fee is valid for the duration of your passport. Western European and US guests are not required to pay a "reciprocity fee".
- How to pay Payment can be made in cash (Chilean Pesos or US Dollars) or by Visa, MasterCard and American Express credit cards.
- Tourist Card A 90-day tourist card is issued to all arriving visitors (normally during the flight to Santiago), and this is renewable for another 90 days at the Departamento de Extranjeria.

Argentina

- Citizens of the United States, Canada, the European Union, Australia, New Zealand, and South Africa require a valid passport to enter the country. No visa is required for citizens of these countries for tourist stays of up to 90 days.
- Reciprocity Fee: This fee corresponds to the amount an Argentine national must pay when purchasing a visa to other countries. The fee is valid for the duration of your passport. The payment of this "reciprocity fee" is not a visa Argentina does not require a visa for citizens of the United States, Canada, the European Union, Australia, New Zealand, and South Africa when traveling for tourism or business purposes.

Peru

- No visa is necessary for U.S citizens or citizens of most other countries. Please consult with your local Peruvian embassy.
- Please keep your landing card with you throughout your travels in Peru, as you will be asked for the card at hotels, which will exempt you from local taxes and immigration upon departure.

Ecuador

• No visas are required for U.S. citizens or citizens of most other countries. There are exceptions for some Asian, Central American and European countries. Please consult with your consulate.

Special Health Requirements

What kind of medical precautions should my guests take before travel?

- Guests are urged to consult their physician before they travel to South America for advice on precautions against malaria, cholera, typhoid, yellow fever and dengue fever.
- Anyone who has any special medication should take enough supplies to last the visit.
- Yellow fever certificates are required for entry into the Amazon or if guests have travelled, or will be travelling, through the yellow fever belt.
- Altitude sickness may develop in those who ascend rapidly to altitudes greater than 2 500 metres (8 202 feet). Symptoms may include headaches, nausea, vomiting, dizziness, malaise, insomnia and loss of appetite.
 - o The best treatment for altitude sickness is descent. If you are exhibiting symptoms, do not ascend. If symptoms are severe or persistent, descend immediately.
 - o When traveling to high altitudes, it's also important to avoid overexertion, eat light meals and abstain from alcohol. Some high-altitude areas have a clinic where oxygen is available.
- No specific shots or vaccines are necessary for travellers to Ecuador, although vaccinations against Hepatitis A are always a good idea.

Money

Is it easy to change money or use credit cards when travelling in South America?

Chile

• The official currency is the Chilean Peso. MasterCard, Visa, American Express and Diners Club are regularly accepted throughout the country, though visitors should not count on being able to use their card in rural areas. Storeowners will sometimes charge more for purchases made with a credit card. The easiest way to obtain local currency is by using ATMs. You can exchange money at any established "Casa de Cambio" at market driven exchange rates. They are common in commercial areas as well as in shopping malls. US Dollars are often accepted in more touristic areas and in hotels. Foreign travellers who pay in dollars are exempt from paying the 19% IVA tax. Travellers cheques can be cashed at the banks or the exchange houses in main cities, but passports are essential for these transactions.

Argentina

- The legal tender currency in Argentina is the Argentine Peso. Some stores may accept US Dollars; however, it is easier to exchange them in banks or an authorized Exchange Bureaux.
- The legal tender notes are 100, 50, 20, 10, 5 and 2 Pesos, and the coins 1 Peso, 50, 25, 10 and 5 cents (there are also 1 cent coins but they are rarely used).
- Visa and MasterCard are the most widely accepted credit cards, but don't rely on them some travellers have reported problems getting vendors to accept credit cards. The same goes for traveller's checks.

Peru

• Peru's official currency is the Nuevos Sol (S/). The US Dollar is the second currency; many hotels post their rates in dollars, and plenty of shops, taxi drivers, restaurants, and hotels across Peru accept US Dollars for payment. Exchange houses, or by using credit or debit card ATMs, are the best way to exchange cash.

Ecuador

• The official unit of currency in Ecuador is the US Dollar. The easiest and best way to get cash is from an ATM. Visa, Mastercard and Amex are accepted.

Luggage allowance

What are the luggage restrictions when travelling to South America?

As you will be travelling in vehicles and aircraft with limited space, maximum permitted luggage on domestic flights is as follows:

Chile

- Carry-on baggage: 8 kilos 17 pounds
- Checked baggage allowance : 23 kilos 50 pounds (1 bag)

Argentina

- Carry-on baggage: 5 kilos 11 pounds
- Checked baggage allowance : 15 kilos 33 pounds

Peru

Flights:

- Carry-on baggage: 8 kilos 17 pounds
- Checked baggage allowance : 23 kilos 50 pounds (1 bag)

Train to Machu Picchu:

- There are strict luggage restrictions for the train rides to Machu Picchu because there is no room for luggage on the train. Passengers should carry small hand luggage, which can fit below the passenger's seat or in the above compartment. Maximum weight per passenger is 5 kilos or 11 pounds (Perurail and Incarail lines).
- &Beyond will handle the storing and logistics of the rest of your guests' luggage for this portion of the trip.

Ecuador

- Carry-on baggage: 8 kilos 17 pounds
- Checked baggage allowance: 23 kilos 50 pounds (1 bag)

Clothing

What should my guests pack?

It's always best to pack less and travel light. Remember that laundry facilities are available at most of our partner properties (at an additional cost). Generally, try to pack a variety of clothes to suit changes in climate – layers of clothing in 'breathable' fabrics are ideal. Comfortable walking shoes are a necessity as a lot of the exploring is on foot. If visiting the jungle, waterproof clothing and footwear is essential. Most of the jungle lodges will provide you with rubber boots, which are the best footwear to tackle muddy and wet paths. At high altitudes and the coast, a hat is essential, together with sun block and sunglasses, as the atmosphere is very thin and burns fair skin very quickly.

Electricity

Will there be electricity where my guests are travelling?

Most towns and cities in South America are electrified. Lodges in remote areas generally rely on generator power for lighting and refrigeration. It is advisable for guests to bring international adaptors with them.

Photography

In terms of photography, what should my guests take into consideration?

- Guests must ensure that they bring sufficient memory cards and batteries as these may not be readily available.
- Guests must remember to ask permission before taking a photograph of any local resident. South Americans are renowned for being friendly; however it is courteous to ask permission before snapping away.

Gratuity

What are the gratuity guidelines in South America?

- It is customary to tip 10% of the bill at hotels and restaurants.
- The tipping guidelines for Chile, Argentina, Ecuador and Peru are similar.
- Being a personal matter, gratuities for local guides and drivers are not included and are left to the guests' discretion. Please note that gratuity is not compulsory and is based on staff performance, and this information is a guideline for a standard amount.
