Polar Bear Safari

Manitoba, Canada

The terrain surrounding the lodges of <u>Churchill Wild</u> is equally as vast and wild as the Serengeti, but ruled by ice and polar bears. The tundra is an ecosystem like no other, where every species down to the lichen has a tale of adaptation and survival. Guides at Seal River Heritage Lodge and Nanuk Polar Bear Lodge bring it all vividly to life on an arctic safari. Learn about beluga behavior and the body language of polar bears, and seek out some of the tundra's more elusive creatures like wolves and caribou. Birding Safari

INKATERRA HACIENDA CONCEPCIÓN Amazon Rain Forest, Peru

There are few better places for a birding safari than the Amazon rain forest, home to some 1,300 different species. Set on a private reserve along the Madre de Dios River, with the pristine Tambopata National Reserve a short boat ride away, there are loads of bird habitats to explore at <u>Inkaterra Hacienda Concepción</u>. In your screened-in bungalow, you can even see and hear them from bed. Watch scarlet or yellow-and-blue macaws and capped herons while paddling a canoe on an oxbow lake, spot an oropendula on the way to lunch, or row past tanagers and prehistoric-looking hoatzins on a lagoon on the property.



Jungle Safari

SUKAU RAINFOREST LODGE Sabah, Malaysian Borneo

Every year, monsoon rains flood Malaysian Borneo's Kinabatangan River basin, filling jungle waterways and nourishing the habitats of some of the planet's most unusual species: wild orangutans, pygmy elephants, and proboscis monkeys. Perched on stilts near the river's edge, <u>Sukau Rainforest Lodge</u> is your gateway into this rare wilderness. Glide along the waterways in an electric-motored boat on a jungle safari, and then relax in the lodge pool as you watch monkeys and rare birds flit through the surrounding trees.



Flower Safari

GROOTBOS PRIVATE NATURE RESERVE Western Cape, South Africa

The Cape Floral Kingdom harbors some 9,000 species of flowering fynbos plants, 69 percent of which are found nowhere else on Earth. Situated amid this colorful kingdom, <u>Grootbos Private Nature Reserve</u> offers flower safaris across coastal hillsides blanketed in blooms. Hop into an open-top 4x4 with a naturalist guide to find out how the hardy fynbos survive and thrive, and discover their unique adaptations to the birds and insects that share their habitat.



Coastal Safari

NIMMO BAY WILDERNESS RESORT British Columbia, Canada

British Columbia's Great Bear Rainforest is a misty wonderland of glacier-cut fjords and ice-capped mountains flanked by ancient cedar forests. These mystical woodlands harbor rare wildlife—including the elusive white Kermode bear—while orcas, humpbacks, white-sided dolphins, and sea lions frequent the maze of coastal waterways. You're likely to spot some of these incredible creatures during a stay at <u>Nimmo Bay Wilderness</u> <u>Resort</u>, where you can head into surrounding wilderness on a coastal safari, exploring by kayak, paddle board, foot, and more.
